Social Media Messages/Graphics: Preparedness Tips We



Life-saving tips for anyone stranded in winter weather:

- Run vehicle sporadically to stay warm
- Keep exhaust clear from snow
- Turn on lights/add bright markers to be seen
- Don't leave the vehicle or overexert yourself

- Here are a few essentials to keep you ready for the unexpected:
- Emergency kit: Stock up on non-perishable food, water, first aid supplies, and essentials.
- Communication plan: Have a family emergency contact list handy.

- Practice drills: Know your evacuation routes and practice them with your family.

Talking Points: Preparedness Tips We



1. Why Be Ready:

- Being ready for emergencies keeps you safe.
- It's not just for big disasters small things count too.

2. Family Plan:

- Make a plan with your family.
- Know where to go if you have to leave home.

3. Emergency Kit:

- Have a box with food, water, and important papers.
- Check it sometimes to make sure everything is okay.

4. Talk to Each Other:

- Have a way to talk to family and friends.
- Pick someone from another town to call if you can't reach each other.

5. Stay Updated:

- Watch the news for important information.
- Get alerts on your phone if you can.

6. Help Each Other:

- Talk to your neighbors about emergencies.
- Practice getting safe together.

7. Know Your Area:

- Learn about the dangers where you live.
- Plan for the things that could happen.

8. Practice Safety:

- Do drills at home to be ready.
- Learn simple first aid it's like knowing how to help when someone is hurt.

9. Take Care of Everyone:

- Think about kids, older people, or anyone who needs extra help.
- Include what they need in your plan.

10. Stay Strong:

- Being ready helps you stay strong when things are hard.
- Do a bit at a time it's easier that way.

Create an Emergency Plan

Develop a comprehensive emergency plan for your household. Include evacuation routes, emergency contacts, and a meeting point.

Build an Emergency Kit

Assemble a well-stocked emergency kit that includes essentials such as water, non-perishable food, a flashlight, batteries, a first aid kit, medications, important documents, and basic tools.

Talking Points: Preparedness Tips We



By incorporating these emergency preparedness tips into your Valentine's Day plans, you can ensure that you and your partner are ready for an emergency while still enjoying a special and safe celebration.

Communication Plan

- Establish a communication plan with your partner in case of emergencies, including a meeting point or contact person.
- Share important phone numbers and have a designated emergency contact.

Emergency Kit for Date Night

- Pack a small emergency kit with essentials such as a flashlight, first aid supplies, snacks, water, and any necessary medications.
- Include a list of allergies or medical conditions in case of unexpected situations.

Know the Safety Measures

- Know the safety measures in place at the restaurant or place you plan to visit.
- Take the time to understand the locations of emergency exits, be aware of fire extinguisher placements, and familiarize yourself with the designated emergency evacuation routes.

Transportation Safety

- If using transportation services, know the emergency procedures and exits.
- Keep the contact information of a reliable taxi or rideshare service in case alternative transportation is needed.

Weather Considerations

- Stay informed about the weather conditions, especially if your plans involve outdoor
- Have appropriate clothing and gear for unexpected weather changes.

Stay Informed

- Monitor local news and weather updates for any potential emergencies in the area.
- Be aware of community alerts or advisories that may impact your plans.

Charge Devices

- Ensure your phones are fully charged to have access to communication in case of an emergency.
- Carry a portable charger to keep your devices powered throughout the day.

Emergency Contact Information

- Have a list of emergency contacts, including family members, friends, and local authorities.
- Store this information in your phone and share it with your partner.

Safe Meeting Points

- Identify safe meeting points in case you and your partner get separated during an emergency.
- Choose locations that are easily accessible and known to both of you.

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Talking Points: Know Your Winter Weather Terms

1. Winter Weather Overview:

 Winter storms vary from moderate snow to severe blizzards, featuring wind-driven snow, low temperatures, strong winds, icing, sleet, and freezing rain.

2. Winter Weather Advisory:

- Caution is advised when a Winter Weather Advisory is issued.
- Expect light wintry precipitation or patchy blowing snow, causing slick conditions.
- Travel may be affected if precautions are not taken.

3. Winter Storm Watch:

- Be prepared when a Winter Storm Watch is announced.
- Medium confidence that a significant winter storm with heavy snow, sleet, or freezing rain may occur.
- Anticipate potential impacts and prepare accordingly.

4. Winter Storm Warning:

- Take immediate action when a Winter Storm Warning is issued.
- High confidence that a winter storm will bring heavy snow, sleet, or freezing rain with significant impacts.
- Prepare for challenging conditions and possible disruptions.

5. Common Winter Weather Terms:

- Understand the range of winter weather terms, from advisory to warning.
- Recognize the potential dangers associated with low temperatures, strong winds, and various forms of precipitation.

6. Safety Measures:

- Emphasize the importance of safety during winter weather events.
- Encourage listeners to stay informed, heed warnings, and take necessary precautions for travel and outdoor activities.
